CELEBRATE INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

March 8th International Women's Day was first observed in 1908 when suffragettes marched in New York City for better pay, shorter working hours, and the right to vote. In 1911, Germany, Denmark, Switzerland, Austria, as well as the US all joined in to celebrate the day, definitely making it international. It further came to prominence when the United Nations (UN) General Assembly in 1977 invited member states to proclaim March 8th as International Women's Day, an official UN holiday for women's rights and world peace.

This year's UN theme for International Women's Day is Invest in Women: Accelerate progress. Our world faces many challenges putting communities in crises. Gender equality is critical if future generations will realize economic prosperity and a healthy planet.

Five key areas of focus that require action to ensure women are not left behind:

- → Investing in Women: A Human Rights Issue
 - ◆ Progress for women benefits us all and builds a more inclusive society.
- → Ending Poverty
- ◆ The pandemic, world conflicts, climate disasters, and resulting economic chaos have all contributed to many more people (particularly women with children) living below the poverty line.
- → Implementing Gender-Responsive Financing
- ◆ Cuts to public spending brought on by conflicts, rising fuel and food costs have disproportionately impacted women in regard to public services and social protection.
- → Shift to a Green Economy and a Care Society
- ◆ Advocates propose an alternative economic model that stresses a green economy and care society that amplifies women's voices and ideas.
- → Support Feminist Change-Makers
- ◆ Organizations that fight for women's equality and lifting women out of poverty receive little official development assistance. The UN notes these organizations receive 0.13 percent of total official development assistance.

So......celebrate the day, acknowledge achievements, tackle prejudices and inequalities, and open discussions on how we (you) can bring about change. And, wear your purple (signifying justice and dignity), green (standing for hope), and white (symbolizing purity
