PUBLIC POLICY

Women Advocating for Paid Family Medical Leave

According to the March 2022 U.S. Census Compensation Survey, approximately 66% of Pennsylvania workers do not have access to *paid* family and medical leave benefits. The Executive Forum of Women, organized in the late 1970's, notes that women in the household are often the individuals

bearing the biggest impact of unpaid work. Meghan Pierce, CEO of the Executive Forum of Women in Philadelphia, cites a common story among members of the need to manage care for children, parents or a sick relative while trying to advance their career.

Benefits of Paid Leave:

- For Parents
 - Healthy development of newborn, enhancement of family economic security;
- For the Individual and the Caregiver
 - > Reduced stress and financial security;
- For Businesses
 - Improved employee retention and productivity.

Cost Consideration:

A model similar to social security has been proposed by legislators where individuals pay upfront for benefits used at a later date. In 2017, the PA Department of Labor and Industry Center for Workforce Information and Analysis, conducted a study for potential cost of the payroll tax idea to fund the program. The average weekly cost for workers would be between \$2.37 and \$5.50 as a payroll tax.

Legislation Update:

In partnership with nonprofits and businesses, The Executive Forum of Women is now making a concerted effort to get paid leave established as a state law in Pennsylvania. After over 10 years of debate and failed legislation, bipartisan support may have the momentum to push through the legislation. A bill is anticipated to be introduced in both the House and Senate in mid-March.

Note: In 1993, the Federal government enacted the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA) providing certain employees up to 12 weeks of *unpaid* job protected leave

per year. FMLA applies to all public agencies, public and private elementary and secondary schools, and companies with 50 or more employees.
